Keynote by Adnan Darwiche

Generalized Decision Diagrams: The game is not over yet!

Prof. Adnan Darwiche from UCLA, California, will talk about the influential role of decision diagrams in computer science and AI, and about a generalization of Ordered Binary Decision Diagrams called Sentential Decision Diagrams. He will discuss recent theoretical and empirical results and the ongoing quest for practical generalizations of OBDDs.

Prof. Darwiche's interests include probabilistic and symbolic reasoning, with their applications to diagnosis, planning, and cognition, in addition to system design and analysis. He is a former chair of the CS department at UCLA and a former editor-in-chief for the Journal of Artificial Intelligence Research.





François Rabelais 1494 – April 9th, 1553

A major French Renaissance writer, doctor, Renaissance humanist, monk and Greek scholar. He has historically been regarded as a writer of fantasy, satire, the grotesque, bawdy jokes and songs. His best known work is Gargantua and Pantagruel. Rabelais was first a novice of the Franciscan order, and later a friar at Fontenay-le-Comte, where he studied Greek and Latin, as well as science, philology, and law. Later he left the monastery to study at the University of Poitiers and University of Montpellier. Using the pseudonym Alcofribas Nasier (an anagram of François Rabelais minus the cedille on the c), in 1532 he published his first book, Pantagruel, that would be the start of his Gargantua series.

Tourism Tip: Palavas-les-Flots

Palavas-les-Flots is a seaside resort twelve kilometers south of Montpellier, at the Mediterranean Sea. It lies on a strip of sand dunes that separates two lakes, Étang de l'Arnel and Étang du Méjean, from the sea. From Port Marianne (Tram Line 1), following the river Lez, there is a bike route that will get you directly to the beach. You can do this by foot (10 km) or by bike. To rent bikes go to the TAM office in front of the railway station. Alternatively, at the left hand side of the train station there is a bike station that allows you to hire bikes simply using your credit card. If you plan to do this during the day do not forget sunglasses and a hat since there is no shade throughout the route! The scenery is amazing and well worth it: white horses, pink flamingos and many birds! In Palavas you may have a drink or food by the waterfront or simple relax on the beach. If you're not very interested in cycling, you can always go there by bus. Bus number 131 from Pérols - Étangs (Tram Line 3) will drop you in Palavas after a 15 minutes ride.




